conference" in Santa Cruz this November to explore new retail trends, mixed use development, placemaking, co-working, and mobility.



# **Graffiti Abatement Program Update**

Graffiti Abatement removed a total of 344 public tags in both July 2017 and July 2016.



However, the total surface area cleaned in July 2017 was 5972 sq. ft., which is an increase compared to July 2016, a total of 4115 sq. ft.

The City of Santa Cruz Graffiti Abatement Program has 3 easy ways of reporting graffiti on public and private property:

Please provide a description of the tag on the object or surface and the location with the nearest address or cross street and if possible a photo.

Quick removal within 24 to 48 hours is proven to be the most effective way to deterrent against graffiti vandalism. The longer graffiti remains the greater the chances graffiti vandals will return. ### **River Update**

### GOVERNOR SIGNS SAN LORENZO RIVER LEGISLATION



August 3rd the City received news that Governor Jerry Brown had signed AB 436 which was introduced by Assemblymember Mark Stone to assist in the future financing of the final phases of the San Lorenzo River Flood Control Project.

Over the last 25 years the City, State and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers have jointly funded the improvements to the San Lorenzo River Flood Control Project. Last year the Corps of Engineers informed the City that due to Federal funding cuts it could no longer participate in future river improvements. AB 436 now allows the City of Santa Cruz

and the State of California to partner in future improvements without Corps of Engineers participation. This bill was technical in nature, but is one of the strategies being used by the City to complete necessary infrastructure improvements without Federal funding. AB 436 becomes effective January 1, 2018. The City's Joe Hall was instrumental in drafting the bill that was ultimately signed by the Governor-go, Joe!

### City Arts Update

Congratulations to Cabrillo College on earning a two-year California Community College grant totaling \$700,000 to create an inclusive makerspace community! Students and the Santa Cruz Community will have access, training, and community in using 3-D scanners, 3-D printers, laser cutters/etchers, CNC machines,



Computer Aided Design (CAD), a digital knife, and all prototyping and creation that this space enables.

### **SCPD Installs Carbon Monoxide Detectors in Patrol Ford Explorers**



SCPD is taking action over concerns that the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration is expanding a probe into 1.33 million law enforcement Ford Explorers. Carbon monoxide fumes from Ford Explorer patrol vehicles are seeping inside the SUVs, and causing officers to be sick.

This week, carbon monoxide detectors were installed in all Ford Explorers in SCPD's fleet. The monitors are installed behind the front passenger seat. Carbon monoxide can lead to nausea and shortness of breath.

The cause of the malfunction is being investigated and a permanent solution is yet to be identified. "Officer safety is paramount." said Sergeant Bush. As a precaution, carbon monoxide detectors are necessary until the issue is resolved by Ford."

# Great Police Work - SCPD Shooting Investigation Leads to Arrest & Search Warrant Nets Drugs, Firearms & \$36,500

After an in-depth investigation, Santa Cruz Police arrested Deshawn Hatfield in the 7/16 /17 attempted homicide shooting, which also led Detectives to a drug dealing operation. Santa Cruz Police Department and the Neighborhood Enforcement Team (NET) executed a search warrant at a residence in the 100 block of Kennan Street. Officers found 20 grams of methamphetamine, 1 pound of cocaine, 14 ounces of

crack cocaine, 5 pounds of marijuana, firearms, dozens of rounds of ammunition, and \$36,500.

Said Chief Mills, "I cannot express how grateful I am to my officers who made the arrests possible. Because of their efforts, the suspect involved in the attempted homicide is now in custody. It was the great teamwork and effort of our detectives and Neighborhood Enforcement Team who pieced together facts and circumstances leading to the identification and apprehension of the suspect which then also allowed us to shut down a drug operation." We are in the last full session of Summer Day Camp programs at Harvey West Park and Main Beach. So far this summer, we have had 780 children come through our six various camps. Summer Camps have enrolled the highest numbers in over eight years. There is a final one-week camp being offered before school starts for those who just didn't get enough!



### WATER

Just before I started to write this, a man came into the lobby of our customer service area. He reported to one of our customer service representatives that he was suicidal and needed help. While two of our representatives sat and talked with him, a third called 911. Within a few minutes the police had come and the man was taken to get help.

This is a good opportunity for me to acknowledge that the Water Department customer service staff is exceptional. While supporting a suicidal man until he can get help doesn't happen often, it's not unusual to see our staff holding customers' babies, children or dogs so that the customer can more easily pay their bill, or for our customer service staff to go put their own money in customers' parking meters for them so that they won't get a ticket. It's also not unusual for our customer service staff to help customers with City-related issues that have nothing to do with water or utilities. They truly are the face of our City and we're so lucky to have them.

Each year, the Water Department is required to produce a Consumer Confidence Report on the quality of our drinking water in a format dictated by state and federal regulations. The report is a summary of the water quality tests performed in the prior year which includes all detectable and regulated compounds (AKA contaminants) in both treated water and raw water sources. The most essential testing that we perform is our bacteriological monitoring program, which tests for unwanted bacteria, viruses or parasites. We strictly follow the state and federal regulations on a pre-set schedule and for a population the size of Santa Cruz; we conduct at least 100 tests per month just for coliforms and Escherichia coli alone. Last but not least, we completed replacement of a leaky 8"cast-iron water main from 1946 on 14<sup>th</sup> Avenue this week. After 70 years in the system, we felt our community had gotten their money's worth from it.

# **PUBLIC WORKS**

### **Engineering**

Our repaying of Ocean Street as part of the Fall 2016 Overlay Project included installation of 1" asphalt leveling, TruPave paying fabric and 2" of asphalt concrete overlay from Soquel Avenue to East Cliff Drive.

### **Resource Recovery Waste Reduction**

Waste Reduction staff visited the Davis Street Transfer Station and Education Center in San Leandro. We learned about their recycling school tour program and discussed recycling in the context of the Next Generation Science Standards. Staff also toured El Cerrito's Eco Park, a self-serve recycling center that includes bins for recycling, HHW, E-waste, and a reuse Exchange Zone.

Staff is working on a food service business outreach letter that will inform businesses of proposed changes to the Environmentally Acceptable Packaging and Products Ordinance. As recommended by the Public Works and Transportation Commission, the proposed changes will be presented to City Council in September.

Staff is working with collections to schedule site visits at food service businesses to begin our Food Scraps Collection Program later in August. The program will begin with a combination of restaurants, bakeries, grocery stores and commercial kitchens. Businesses are excited about the program and eager to participate. Below is a poster that businesses are receiving as part of the outreach effort.



### **Wastewater Treatment Facility**

Numerous large pumps throughout the plant are being taken apart and repaired as needed to ensure continued water movement throughout the treatment process. Operations staff have been adjusting and optimizing hydraulic flows out of distributor arms for the trickling filters where the bulk of the biological treatment occurs.









### **Laboratory and Environmental Compliance**

The Laboratory working in coordination with Collection and Flood Control staff sampled the beach vault, the gravity mains and the force mains draining to the beach around Cowell this week. Numerous samples were taken to the lab to be tested for fecal indicator bacteria; caffeine as well as DNA markers of dog and human bacteria. These tests help the City to resolve the integrity of the sewer system and to investigate the probable sources of the indicator bacteria in the water. After the sampling by the laboratory, staff of the Collection system evacuated the content of the beach vault and transported its contents to the wastewater treatment plant for treatment. The laboratory documented the exercise with photographs including one that showed the continuing impacts of birds in the area.
