Affordable Housing Update

HABITAT DEDICATION CEREMONY - 430 AND 430-B FREDERICK ST

Habitat for Humanity Monterey Bay held a dedication ceremony on Monday, July 17, 2017 for its newly constructed homes at 430 Frederick St.

Funded in part by the city's HOME entitlement grant, the project consists of a two-bedroom single family dwelling and a one-bedroom ADU.

Deed restricted to be affordable to households earning no more than 60% of area median income; the units provide a sorely-needed entry into the red hot housing market in Santa Cruz.

Buyers must invest at least 500 hours of labor on the project, and take title to the property as "tenants-incommon". Future sales of the units must comply with Habitat's and the City's affordability covenants.

Annual Affordable Housing Monitoring

Did you know that the Economic Development Department Housing and Community Development Division conducts annual monitoring of affordable housing projects and ADUs? Through the monitoring process the City verifies that property owners are complying with their respective affordable housing agreements. The monitoring differs depending on the type of housing being monitored, including Measure O owner-occupied and rental units, ADU owner-occupied and affordable ADU units, HOME-assisted rental units and HOME-assisted First Time Homebuyer units, and projects created with the help of Redevelopment funds.

What happens if there is an issue of non-compliance?

The City works with property owners or managers to get units back into compliance. If Housing and Community Development staff cannot get an owner or manager into compliance, the case is referred to Planning's Code Compliance Division. The ultimate goal is always compliance.

City Arts Update

SCOPE PARK MURAL OPEN HOUSE AND PUBLIC HEARING FOR NEW MURAL

City Arts and the <u>Santa Cruz Arts Commission</u> invite the public to view the draft concept for a new mural at Scope Park - next to the Clock Tower at North Pacific and Mission St. on **Wednesday, August 2, 2017 from 5:00pm-6:30pm.** The artist will be on site taking comments in preparation for the Arts Commission decision – which follows on **August 9, 2017 from 6:00pm-7:00pm** with a public hearing regarding the proposed design. There will be time for public

comment at this meeting. The meeting will be in the City Hall Council Chambers – 809 Center Street.

Artist <u>Sarah Bianco</u> was selected based on the concept she presented to a selection panel and her thoughtful view of inclusivity. Inspired by ideas of children and their openness and of dissolving boundaries, her concept features children jumping in a variety of poses, the Santa Cruz coastline, a web of honeycomb and dots and the phrase "Jump In!" The mural represents connection and taking risks. To her, for a community to be inclusive all of us must



take personal responsibly for including and connecting with others.

If approved by the Arts Commission the new mural will replace the current mural, *Moonlight Dance*, which has been a cherished symbol of the open and accepting culture of Santa Cruz for almost 25 years. First installed at Scope Park by Peter Bartczak in 1993, the artist graciously gave his blessing for a new mural on site – and a Farewell Party was held on July 15, 2017, celebrating the mural and his legacy.

NEW BUSINESS WELCOME LETTERS GO OUT MONTHLY



Every month, the Economic Development Office sends out a welcome packet to new businesses and new business owners that have applied for their Business License. This is one of many ways Economic Development connects with businesses and lets them know that the City is here to help.

The packet includes a welcome letter signed by the Mayor and Economic Development Director and includes information about the business support Economic Development can provide as well as other resources available to businesses. Also included in this packet are flyers from the Small Business Development Center about

their resources and yearly Small Business Brown Bag Series, and the Green Business Program on the Green Business Certification Process.

Already this year, 121 new business packets have gone out or are in the process of being mailed to new businesses and new business owners.

Trolley Update

FUELING THE TROLLEY



The Santa Cruz Trolley runs on Compressed Natural Gas (CNG). CNG vehicles typically have 20% fewer greenhouse gas emissions than gasoline powered cars, and CNG on average costs 1/3 less than conventional gasoline. While this is great for the environment, fueling the Trolley has often been a challenge since there are only a few local locations that can accommodate the Trolley's fueling needs.

The Trolley has fueled at the County CNG fueling site for the past 5 years. At the beginning of July, staff learned that the County fueling site had

been decommissioned as of June 30th. While the County fueling site was expected to close sometime this year, it was anticipated to not happen until the fall. With only a few days' worth

of fuel left in the Trolley tanks, staff reached out to UCSC Fleet Services for their help. The trolley was able to fuel just in time to start the weekend service.

Trolley staff is currently working with UCSC to develop a long term fueling agreement, and is looking forward to a continued partnership with UCSC fleet services.

Graffiti Abatement Program Update

GRAFFITI REMOVED FROM GUARD TOWER AT MAIN BEACH



On Friday, July 14 the Graffiti Abatement team worked swiftly to have numerous tags removed from Guard Tower 4 at the Main Beach before the Boardwalk opened to guests. Through coordination between Economic Development's Graffiti Abatement Program Manager and the Boardwalk's Guest Services we were able to make quick communication with Front Office staff and the Manager on Duty to get permission for the Graffiti Contractor to access Entrance 5 to get onto the Boardwalk strip and was able to remove the graffiti from Tower 4 and double checked that there was no graffiti on Towers 2, 3, and 5 before the Boardwalk opened at 10:00 am.

Asset Management Update

Uncle Poop's Annual Statistics

Uncle Poop's Pet Waste Removal for FY 17 has removed a total of 2,932 incidences of waste in the CRM District, which is 14% less than FY16. The total of human waste was 417, which is a 44% increase from FY 16.

Downtown Outreach Worker Annual Statistics

The following chart shows some of the most significant statistics from the annual contacts made by the Downtown Outreach Worker (DOW) comparing FY 2016 with FY 2017. The DOW made 28% more contacts with individuals in FY 17 over FY 16. Some standout increases in assistance provided by the DOW were seen in housing/shelter, medical care, veteran's services and mental health treatment.

Park Host Program at Harvey West Park

Preparation continues for the "Park Host Program" recently approved by City Council for Harvey West Park. Demolition of a dilapidated storage shed at Harvey West Park will make way for a privately owned RV and a Park Host that will help monitor activities at HWP. In addition to site improvements, staff are working with HR to develop a sound selection and screening process for park host applicants.



Pogonip and Rail Cleanup Project

A joint Ranger, PD, Roaring Camp cleanup project on July 19th, collected over 7000 lbs. of debris and metal. Staff along with Labor Max loaded 4 flatbed train cars of debris which was transported to the landfill and recycling center. The project requires a second day of clean up that is scheduled for July 21st.

Resource Recovery

The Storm Water and Refuse and Recycling programs recently had additional pole banners made for both the Ocean Street corridor and the beach area with a "Help Keep Our Beaches Clean" message for residents and tourists. The banners were made by MPress Digital, a local Green Business.



As part of the Resource Recovery Facility's Industrial General Permit requirements, engineering staff submitted the 2016-2017 Annual Report to the State Water Board.

The facility's Solid Waste Facility Permit has been renewed and the next permit review date will be May 27, 2021.

Engineering

Street striping was installed this week as part of the fall 2016 Surface Seal Project. This included Seabright Avenue.





The fall 2016 Overlay Project work completed this week consisted of the demolition, removal and replacement of damaged concrete pavement panels on Ocean Street.





We have distributed a press release and posted information online regarding PG&E's California and Laurel Project to enhance pipeline safety and reliability in the City of Santa Cruz. This work may impact traffic at times from now until late October. Read more.

Wastewater Treatment Facility

Maintenance and electrical/instrumentation continues to work on the in-house rebuild and installation of the County Influent Channel barscreen. Electrical/Instrumentation and Maintenance also combined their efforts to install a new foul odor fan. This replacement fan is oriented in the opposite direction of the original so custom fabrication was involved. Operations continues to ensure facility operation while two contractor projects are in full swing: the Tunnel Portal Box upgrade and Secondary Clarifier 1 tank coating.



Laboratory & Environmental Compliance

Prof Anicet Blanch, University of Barcelona, Spain, a renowned expert in microbial source tracking stopped by the laboratory and chatted with staff on bacteriophage and caffeine uses in tracking water quality and pollution this week. Prof Blanch's university and our laboratory are cooperating in developing a training video on bacteriophage* sampling and analyses. The video which will have the seal of the City of Santa Cruz as an owner will first be presented at the international Water Environment Federation Technical Conference in Chicago in September 2017.

*Bacteriophages are viruses present in sewage impacted water, and only infect bacteria and many experts including USEPA believe that they will help define pollution better than the current bacteria indicators.

Officer Erlach Presented 10851 Award

SCPD's own Bernadette Erlach received an award and "10851" pin for her efforts in recovering numerous stolen vehicles this past year. 10851 is the California Vehicle Code section for automobile theft. Officer Erlach recovered a total of 15 vehicles. 4 of them resulted in the arrest of the occupants. The total value of the recovered vehicles is \$78,500.



The "10851 Award" is presented by the AAA and the California Highway Patrol to recognize outstanding achievement in the detection, investigation, and apprehension of automobile thieves.

WATER

This weekend we have a big project kicking off. One of our key water mains under River Street is almost one-hundred years old. While being a century old is something to celebrate if you're granny Mabel, it's unfortunately bad news if you're a water main. The project beginning this weekend will replace the water main under River Street, as well as the water main under Potrero Street, which has had frequent leaks and breaks in addition to causing frequent headaches for our Distribution staff.



Because of the location of the work that needs to be done – on a well-used traffic corridor – much of the work will be done at night, at least through mid-October. From mid-October through March 2018, work will be done during daytime hours. Two-way traffic will be maintained at all times, but folks will likely experience more traffic and delays. San Lorenzo River Walk

For over a year now, the Rotarians have weeded, mulched and planted a parklet along the Santa Cruz Riverwalk. The Rotarians and the City of Santa Cruz Parks & Recreation staff have contributed to a more beautiful park for the community to enjoy and healthier habitat. On Friday, July 14, a ceremony was conducted to unveil this parklet. Councilmember Noroyan attended and spoke on behalf of the City thanking the work of the Rotary, Coastal Watershed Council and staff.

Coordinated by the Coastal Watershed Council, the Adopt A Parklet program connects local groups and businesses to the San Lorenzo River through the adoption of park spaces at the ingress and egress points of the Riverwalk park. These triangular shaped areas, known as parklets, were once overrun with invasive species.
