

Did you know?

The Santa Cruz Police Department has an on-going prescription drug take-back program. We



have a prescription drop box that provides a no-cost, anonymous collection point for unwanted or expired medicines.

The collection bin is a secure, self-service drop box in our public lobby that is available to community members. Monday through Thursday from 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m.

Bring your unwanted or expired medicines to the police department during the hours that our public lobby is open and use the self-service bin which is clearly marked and located



in the left-hand corner of the front lobby as you face the front counter.

Now is an excellent time to clean out your medicine cabinet. It is important to protect our children, families and the environment by properly disposing of unwanted or expired drugs. Together, we can make Santa Cruz safer for all of us!

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

GONE BUT NOT GOODBYE!

Iconic *Eric's Deli* is closing its Walnut Ave. and Cedar St. location on March 23rd. They are not leaving Santa Cruz for good, however. Owner and Founder Eric Johnson who started the first Eric's Deli in Scotts Valley back in 1973 is looking for a new location downtown that better fits the franchise model. The current site, at roughly 2800 sq. ft., is about twice the size of their typical location. Former franchisee owner Timi Sutton participated in our *Facade Improvement Program* back in 2006 and received a matching grant for the awning, signage, lighting and paint scheme depicted in the photo above. Timi sold the Santa Cruz franchised business back to Eric in the last few years. Eric has since been analyzing and assessing all his franchise stores and is considering other sites in the downtown in the 1,400-1,800 sq. ft. range. In the meantime, a new fine-dining restaurant will be undergoing renovations at the existing Eric's site. Stay tuned for updates on both the new restaurant and Eric's future downtown site!

Farmers' Market



What is your **VISION** for a permanent downtown *Santa Cruz Farmers' Market*? Staff has been working with the Santa Cruz Farmers' Market leadership to discuss potential future market needs, stall layouts, parking and ingress and egress on the city-owned lot between Cathcart and Front Streets. While the above rendering is only conceptual, having a visual representation of size, space and structure needs facilitates the conversation with the full Santa Cruz Farmers' Market board. The plaza in the foreground represents the future private mixed-use development on Front Street that has recently submitted an application for development. Staff anticipates coming forward to Council in April/early May for potential options for consideration and Council direction.

WATER

We've been glad to see the rainy weather over the past week. We've seen a little bump in storage at Loch Lomond; we're still a little over two-feet from spilling. What does that mean in terms of how much more rain we would need to spill? Well, if you took all of the rain we've received in March, and doubled it, we would likely spill. Fingers crossed April will be a productive rain month. (You can see the most recent Water Supply Outlook here.)

Our Conservation team, along with a few other utilities, has been asked to help guide the State Water Board in developing water loss performance standards. We'll be performing another acoustic leak detection survey later this spring to help us identify leaks underground that result in water loss to our system.

We've been working with Parks and Recreation to install Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) on many City park water meters (as part of an overall AMI pilot program.) This will help Parks and Rec keep better track of their water use in an effort to help lower their water bills.

The fourth annual State of the San Lorenzo River symposium and tour is this weekend. Originally intended as an event to get everyone working on various aspects of the river on the same page, the symposium has grown and evolved over the years to become popular even with lay people. The Parks Division Urban Forestry Program and Cabrillo College's Horticultural Program teamed up on March 15 for National Arbor Day. The plantings are also part of the Cal-Fire Inventory and Tree Planting Grant and will help sequester GHG emissions. PUBLIC WORKS

Wastewater Treatment Facility

Efficient operations continue along with routine maintenance and preparation for upcoming projects. The mechanics are busy welding and training newer staff how to weld on gearboxes that will be replacing older parts in the plant. Electricians have been extra attentive to our effluent flow meter, verifying its calibration and cleaning it regularly. Electricians are also dealing with a breaker replacement for one of our backup power generators. Mechanics have also been rehabilitating the out-of-service Primary Grit Re-aeration Tank by replacing valves and belts on the grit pumps.









Resource Recovery

Engineering_staff recently submitted the 2017 Annual Monitoring report to the Monterey Air Resources Board for the Resource Recovery Facility which was due on March 15. Collections staff is coping with only 5 out of 10 Hybrid Residential side arm trucks given 5 down for repair with ongoing transmission issues.
