
### **“Super Saturday” Summer Registration**

### Resource Recovery

Last Saturday, nine Master Recyclers from the 2019 and 2018 classes volunteered at our outreach table at the Cocoanut Grove Veg Fest. It was a very successful event as they interfaced with about 350 people over the course of the day. Their outreach is of great assistance to the environmental community. After completing formal instruction, Master Recyclers are required to do additional projects or provide environmental community service for the City. You will be able to meet some of them at Earth Day as they staff the various recycling stations.



### Wastewater Treatment Facility

The Santa Cruz Wastewater Treatment Facility has been an EPA Green Power Partner since 2010, using renewably produced electricity thereby supporting the development of new renewable generation capacities nationwide while also helping to protect the environment. Each year the facility submits a report on how much power is imported from local suppliers, the

type of power purchased (renewable or fossil fuel supplied) and how much electricity is produced on-site.

For 2018 the Wastewater Treatment Facility is proud to have operated the facility on 91% green-produced power, contributing to the City's Sustainability Program. This percentage was achieved through the on-site production of electricity from solar panel arrays and cogeneration through burning on-site produced methane gas to run electricity generating engines.

The City also made a decision this past year to purchase power through the local Community Choice Aggregation provider, Monterey Bay Community Power.

In total the facility used 11,550,424-kWh of electricity in 2018 with 91% being sourced from Green Power totaling 10,475,744-kWh: 2,507,588-kWh was produced from Monterey Bay Community Power while 7,968,156-kWh was produced from renewable on-site generation.



### Environmental Laboratory

### Transportation Engineering/Community Relations

We have completed our Bay Street Sidewalk Completion Infill Project. It began with the award of a \$628,000 Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) Cycle 7 grant to construct sidewalk on Bay Street between King Street and Escalona Drive. The intent of the project was to reduce roadway collisions particularly for our most vulnerable users, bicyclists and pedestrians, and to encourage active transportation through increased access, ADA compliant sidewalks, and enhanced bike lane striping.

Construction began on September 18, 2018. Our contractor, Granite Rock Company, installed ADA compliant sidewalk, driveway approaches, curb and gutter, ADA curb ramps, guardrails and traffic striping. The project was completed within budget.

The grant project complements the City's Pedestrian Master Plan in supporting walking to transit, walking to and from school, and the safety of Bay Street corridor's pedestrian environment by completing the sidewalk between Escalona Drive and King Street on the west side of Bay Street.

## Engineering

The Cedar Street Rehabilitation Project continues Monday, April 15, through Friday, May 31, with one lane closure and detour. The project, funded by Measure H and Measure D tax dollars and a Community Development Block Grant, is rehabilitating/reconstructing Cedar Street from Church Street to Laurel Street.



A critical lift will place two span beams on the Coastal Rail Trail/ [San Lorenzo River Parkway Phase III/Trestle Trail Project](#) on Tuesday, April 16, from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. The bike/pedestrian detour will be slightly modified for this installation. The project which comprises a portion of the Monterey Bay Sanctuary Scenic Trail Segment 8, will replace the existing 4-foot wide walkway on the San Lorenzo River Railroad Trestle Bridge with a new multi-use trail that is 10 feet wide. The new path will be approximately 340 feet long and connect to the existing access ramps at each end of the bridge.

The \$2.03 million construction project is funded with a California Natural Resources Agency grant, Transportation Development Act funds, and City of Santa Cruz and Santa Cruz County Regional Transportation Commission Measure D allocations.



## PLANNING AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

### 314 Jessie St. Community Meeting

On Thursday, March 28th, MidPen Housing held a community meeting at the Louden Nelson Center to gather public input on a potential future housing project at 314 Jessie Street. On December 18, 2018, the Planning Department received an application for Pre-application Review of the future project, which includes demolition of the existing 14-unit, low-income housing development and the construction of a 27-unit housing development with rentals set at 50 percent AMI or below that would serve very low to extremely low income households. Specifically, the applicant indicates that the future tenants would be special needs tenants, high utilizers of emergency services, and individuals who are homeless or at risk of homelessness.



The application was reviewed by all applicable city departments and feedback was provided to the applicant in advance of the community meeting. One member of the Planning Commission Subcommittee and fifteen members of the public attended the meeting. The public asked questions about the removal of existing landscaping, green building methods, relocation plans for existing tenants, and earthquake safety for the new building. The applicant presented two building designs and asked for the attendees to vote for their preference. The applicant is scheduled to meet with city departments on Thursday, April 4th to review the city requirements and comments. The next step will be for the applicant to submit a formal application for the project which is estimated to require a Residential Demolition Authorization Permit, a Coastal Permit, a Design Permit, a General Plan/Local Coastal Program (LCP) Amendment, Rezoning, and a Slope Variance. Staff currently anticipates an approximately 6 to 9 month review process with two required public hearings before the Planning Commission and City Council, and the need for Coastal Commission adoption of the LCP Amendment. The applicant stated that their goal is to start construction in 2021.

### Code Compliance and Rental Inspections

The Code Compliance Division of the Planning & Community Development Department coordinates with other public agencies and non-profit organizations to protect and improve the health, safety and quality of life for the residents and community.

The following are a few examples of substandard and/or hazardous conditions found during Code and Rental inspections and the Community Outreach event designed to assist the residents and the community in the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) areas.

**Property 1:** Through a coordinated inspection with Code, Rental, Fire and Building, 42 units were inspected on 1030 and 1040 River St., for construction work without permits. The inspection revealed that 31 units were found to be in violation of the California Health and Safety Code, the California Building Code and the Santa Cruz Municipal Code. The violations consisted of lofts areas being installed to create sleeping and storage areas. The modifications eliminated emergency escape and rescue requirements and the fire sprinkler requirements. Some modifications eliminated the ventilation and lighting requirements which the tenants tried to address by adding more light fixtures and portable fans.

## **Neighbors of Lower Ocean (NOLO) CLEAN – UP EVENT, Spring 2019**

On Saturday, April 6, 2019, at the end of Barson Street and San Lorenzo Blvd., the NOLO neighborhood marked its 22<sup>th</sup> annual spring clean-up day. The City of Santa Cruz Code Compliance Division, Public Works (Sanitation), Parks & Recreation, Neighbors of Lower Ocean neighborhood and Grey Bears non-profit, gathered to provide neighbors (property owners, tenants and business owners) a means to dispose of rubbish from their properties and allow the residents to work collectively to keep their neighborhood free of unsightly refuse.



At the same time, the clean-up event provided an excellent opportunity for neighbors to meet, greet, share information, eat snacks, and some folks were able to trade re-usable 'treasures'. When these items are re-purposed, it prevents useable house-hold items from going into the City land-fill.

The event removed about 1-ton of rubbish and recycled items. This twice-yearly event has proven successful in creating community- based efforts that enhance partnerships between residents, the City, neighborhood associations and non-profit groups.

### **APRIL NEW TECH MEETUP FEATURES UCSC PH.D. THESIS**

The April New Tech Meetup, hosted at the [Cruzio Co-working](#) space, highlighted winners from the [UCSC Grad Slam](#). At the March Grad Slam – at which Mayor Martine Watkins, Vice Mayor Justin Cummings, and Economic Development Director Bonnie Lipscomb were judges – PH.D. students were given 3 minutes to present on their research and were judged on comprehension/content and engagement/communication.



The New Tech Meetup attendees heard from the top presentations on the topics of sex-specific foraging strategies of seals, the mental workout of bilingualism, resiliency of seabirds in a changing world, and ways to better measure and learn about black holes.

[The Monterey Bay Drones Automation & Robotics Technologies \(DART\)](#) also presented on the growing commercial drone market, which is expected to be a \$1billion industry by 2022. DART's vision is to establish and operate a world class Drone testing and development cluster in the Monterey Bay region; working with industry, government, and academia.

[The Santa Cruz New Tech MeetUp](#) is for Santa Cruz professionals who want to learn about stimulating new technologies that can give their company a competitive edge, boost their career, and spark the flame of entrepreneurship in our community. The meetup takes place on the first Wednesday of every month, and is sponsored and co-hosted by the Economic Development Department.

## **BUSINESS CENTS 101: FREE HANDS-ON FINANCIAL TRAINING WORKSHOP HELD**

The City of Santa Cruz Economic Development Office partnered with National Development Council to offer both aspiring and existing small business owners hands-on training on the basics of budgeting, financial statements, accounting principles and more. Participants also learned how to demonstrate creditworthiness, and how to translate financial statements to a lender. The course also provided an overview of financial resources available from the City of Santa Cruz.



The training was held April 11, 2019 at 5:30pm at the Santa Cruz Police Department Community Room and offered a group of 8 entrepreneurs the chance to get direct assistance and feedback working through exercises and case studies of financial statements and accounting methods.

NDC has been providing small business loans to business owners in Santa Cruz since the Grow Santa Cruz Fund was established in 2010, providing 6 loans totaling \$1.6 million. NDC is known for lending to women and minority business owners while providing hands-on assistance to restructure high-interest loans, right-size loans and shape business plans to achieve success.


## LIBRARY
