POLICE

SCPD TRANSITIONS

This week, SCPD said goodbye to four retiring officers whose combined service to the city is 81 years.

In a farewell at Police
Headquarters attended by
dozens of fellow officers
and family, the SCPD
staged a final radio
broadcast and roll call for
the departing officers.
Sergeant Michael Harms
retires after 22 years of
service; Sergeant Bill Azua
retires after 24 years of



service; Officer Dominic Guerrasio retires after 27 years of service, and Officer Thomas Abarca retires after 8 years of service.

These are four professionals with a lot of experience. "This is a good day for the retirees, and we are rich with a positive legacy they leave behind for the Department. We thank them and their families. Their retirements are well-deserved", said Chief Mills.

MOVING FORWARD:

The loss of experience means that other leaders within the Department must step up and take their places. This week, a record number of 13 candidates interviewed for open sergeants positions. Chief Mills said, "I see so many emerging leaders within the organization that I'm very optimistic."

INNOVATIVE RECRUITING:

Recruit A Cop - "Any community member who knows of a top-notch cop, one who is ready for a new venue, we are willing to pay you, the community member, \$2,000 for pointing the seasoned officer in our direction," per Chief Andy Mills.

Citizens Hiring Bonus: \$2,000 Recruitment Incentive for Lateral Police Hires \$2,000 finder's fee to ANYONE who refers a qualified officer hired by the SCPD. We also offer a \$20,000 hiring bonus for the officer.

SCPD is always searching for good people to join the team. Research has shown, and experience supports, that new hires who come into the organization through referrals are excellent contributors. That's where community recruiting comes in! The new Citizen Hiring Bonus Program also is a meaningful way to include the public in the police officer recruitment process by incentivizing people to recommend qualified police officers.



Eligible officers can be recruited from anywhere in the U.S. They must have completed the police academy and spent time as a sworn officer with a police agency. The officer, when applying, can designate who referred him or her and to make that person eligible for the \$2,000 Citizen Hiring Bonus.

SANTA CRUZ RECYCLED ART PROGRAM (SCRAP) ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS



The Santa Cruz Recycled Art Program (SCRAP) will offer 4-7 selected artists four months of access (mid-July to mid-November) to the waste stream at the City's Resource Recovery Facility (RRF) which is located at 605 Dimeo Ln, Santa Cruz, CA 95060, in order to make art from gleaned, recycled materials.

Two weeks at the end of November will be used to hone the final pieces to polished completion prior to exhibition (writing artist statements, wiring wall works for hanging, procuring appropriate pedestals and other display equipment, photographing work- for promotional materials -our staff.)

Artists may glean a variety of materials ranging from disposed household items (e.g. BBQs, furniture, fabric, carpet, fixtures) to industrial and commercial waste (e.g. concrete, metal, tires, plastics, wood) and much more. Artists may need to transport materials from the RRF. There will be some basic storage available onsite and a way to log requests if you need assistance or are looking for something specific – and want help from RRF staff.

Engineering

The Coastal Rail Trail/Trestle Trail Project continued this week with the installation of toe-kick bars at the bottom of the new railing and removal of scaffolding at piers. The bridge is open to the public as of today, Friday, May 17!



Our Cedar Street Rehabilitation Project replaced failing pavement with new concrete along Cedar from Cathcart to Lincoln. The project, funded by Measure D and Measure H tax dollars and a Community Development Block Grant, is rehabilitating/reconstructing Cedar Street from Church to Laurel.







The Cedar/ Church garage recently was upgraded with new signs displaying Real-Time Parking Space Availability. With the popularity and convenient parking option that the Cedar/Church garage brings, the new signage will make it easier for drivers to know when the lot is full without having to spend the additional time searching for an open parking space.









Resource Recovery

Resource Recovery Collection works with the planning department on their bi-annual Beach Flats cleanup. We provide two roll-off dumpsters, one for garbage and the other for divertible items such as wood, tires, metal, mattresses and ridged plastic. At this week's clean-up, 2.01 tons of garbage and .89 of diversion were taken and disposed of at our Resource Recovery Facility on Dimeo Lane.



We contracted with SCS Engineers to carry out the hands-on waste sort and data collection this week at our landfill on Dimeo Lane. A team of 10 workers, suited up in protective gear, sorted and weighed a sample of refuse from various trucks and routes into separate categories including food, paper and plastics, to name a few. Every 10 years the Resource Recovery Division of Public Works conducts a Waste Characterization Study to better understand what is being collected in the City's refuse waste stream. Information gleaned from this study is used to develop waste reduction, recycling and disposal programs within the City. As an aside, the SCS Engineer noted that four of the sorters were from the River Street Temporary Shelter and were some of the most motivated temporary workers they have ever experienced.





Wastewater Treatment Facility

Operations finished cleaning Primary Sedimentation Basin #6 and Clarifier #1 to allow for mechanics to perform their annual inspection and any needed repairs. Mechanics have also been busy with numerous side repair/upgrade projects, currently working on re-building the Gas Mixing Compressors for the out-of-service Digester #5 which involves stainless steel fabrication.




