WATER

Late last week we turned Loch Lomond into our supply for the first time this year (in a meaningful way.) That's due in part to reduced production from coastal sources and the San Lorenzo River. As we bring in the lake, we're seeing the concentration of total organic carbon increase, as expected, but water quality is still very good.

We've had several meetings recently to prioritize and plan main replacement projects to respond to recent breaks on 7th Avenue and to concerns in the Thurber Lane area.

Work continues on the Water Street main replacement project. We're about halfway through, and will move into nighttime construction next week.



Progress also continues on the new University 5 tank. You can watch a short video clip of construction here.

Last, it has been a very sad week around our office. Kristina Finstad and Vai Campbell, both lost in the Conception dive boat tragedy, were our colleagues and friends. They will be sorely missed.

PUBLIC WORKS

Wastewater Treatment Facility

Operators flooded Solids Contact Tank #1 to test the new diffuser membranes and verified they are operating effectively. The facility ran a microtoxicology test on the septage trucks that bring material to the facility, testing to verify that the material delivered complies with the hauler's disposal permits and will not be toxic/harmful to the microorganism population within the various treatment processes.

The annual protective coating project has resumed. This coating process is part of a 10-year contract to expand the life expectancy of metal surfaces on site. The salty ocean atmosphere at the facility leads to fast corrosion of metal infrastructure and by maintaining a robust coating program the facility avoids expensive refurbishment costs for the metal components.

For the month of August, the facility treated a total of 199.29 million gallons of wastewater: 98.13 million gallons from the City and 102.48 million gallons from the County. The facility also generated around 707.77 tons of class B biosolids that were beneficially reused as fertilizer augmentation for non-food crops.








Operations has been catching up on preventative maintenance tasks, such as performing a sound check of equipment throughout the facility to ensure safety for the staff and ensuring hearing protection is provided in excessive noise areas. The facility mechanics have been busy working inside Solids Contact Tank #1 replacing isolating valve gearboxes and repairing worn aeration pipes.

Both the mechanics and line maintenance staff went through their annual mechanical lift training course, authorizing them all to operate the facility's scissor-lift and the mobile elevating work platform.




Storm Water

We have completed the 2019 wet and dry season visual trash assessments for the State mandated Trash Amendment as part of the City's storm water permit. Visual assessments were performed with a 2 person team and observed trash levels categorized as Low, Moderate, High or Very High using a mobile device application. The City's 2019 assessment results show an improvement of 75% progress towards the goal of zero trash in City streets, curb and sidewalk by 2030!







Operations

The annual San Lorenzo River Flood Control Maintenance Project is scheduled to start on September 9th between the Hwy 1 and Water Street bridges. The work will take a few weeks to complete. The contractor will work downstream and will end by the Riverside Street Bridge. All work will follow current permit and regulatory restrictions. The cuttings will be chipped outside of the levee and disposed of in the fenced area behind Gateway Shopping Center.



Laurel Creek tree work and channel cleanup for flood control will occur on September 16th. The contractor will trim and remove dead branches and will clear sediment buildup in the creek per the City's permit requirements.
