City Manager's Weekly Update October 4, 2019

WATER

2019 Water Year

This week (September 30) the 2019 "water year" ended and the new 2020 year began (October 1). Some highlights from the year that just ended:

- Rainfall in the City of Santa Cruz was 39.7", or 127% of average
- Cumulative discharge from the San Lorenzo River was 153,000 acre-feet
- The water year classification for 2019 was "wet"
- Storage in the reservoir on September 30 was 2.64 billion gallons, 130% of average
- Statewide, reservoir storage is at 128% of average

As a sign of the change of seasons, we're now taking a large percentage of our water from Loch Lomond (vs. from flowing sources.) We're keeping an eye out for the first significant rainfall of the season to recharge flows in the San Lorenzo River and north coast creeks.

Low-Income Energy Savings Assistance Program

We have been working with contractors to expand upon an existing low-income energy savings assistance program offered by PG & E. The program provides qualifying customers access to additional water conservation services, such as fixture replacement. There will now be two contractors trained to perform fixture assessment and toilet replacement services for up to 260 dwelling units this fiscal year. About 80 homes are scheduled to be served this October.

Interpretive Events

October is a month full of interpretive events for 5th grade classrooms of Santa Cruz city schools, conducted by our Water Resource staff. We have two assemblies left to go which will include over 100 students, and which will wrap up the introduction portion of the program. During the assemblies students are introduced to the concepts of water cycle, watershed, water quality, how much water we need, how much water we use, and other species that depend on our watershed to survive. Next week, the "hands-on" portion of the school programs begins. This includes the opportunity for students to engage in different learning activities about turbidity, dissolved oxygen, temperature and ph. Students will also participate in water-testing activities on the Newell Jewell.

Coast Pump Station Noise Mitigation

Neighbors of the Coast Pump Station have complained about noise from the pumps. The pumps are critical to water production; we are committed to being good neighbors. So we are trying to find a balance that eases neighbor concerns, but also allows us to perform our critical work. Unfortunately the pumps are in a very inaccessible location next to the river. We've undertaken a number of steps to decrease noise impacts and this week we replaced one pump motor and installed a sound canopy around the pumps. Initial feedback is that the noise has decreased.




PUBLIC WORKS

Engineering

We are excited to announce that we have awarded construction of the Coastal Rail Trail Segment 7/Phase I to Graniterock Company. The project will create a paved, multi-use path from Natural Bridges Drive to Bay and California streets with construction expected to begin in December and conclude by the end of summer 2020.

Segment 7/Phase I will construct a 1.3 mile paved, 12-16 foot wide bicycle/pedestrian trail entirely along the coastal/south side of the existing rail line. It includes a 60-foot long prefabricated steel truss bridge over Arroyo Seco Channel, a 70-foot long solider pile retaining wall at Almar Avenue, and additional vehicle and bike parking at and around New Leaf Market. Operations

Vegetation management for the San Lorenzo River Flood Control Program has been completed in the area between Highway 1 Bridge and the Soquel Street Bridge. The contracted crew is now working its way toward the Riverside Bridge.





Last month tree work was completed at Laurel Creek to remove fallen branches and dead trees hanging over or fallen into the water behind Cypress Point Apartments. The contractor returned this week to complete the second phase of the project as initially the ground had been too wet for heavy equipment. Thursday grubbing and removal of invasive plants in the creek was done for flood control purposes in preparation for the rainy season.

Sister Cities Next Teen Delegation Departs Spring 2020

The Santa Cruz Public Libraries (SCPL) announced it will host an informational presentation at 6:30-7:30 p.m. on Wednesday at the Downtown Branch Library, 224 Church St. for teens interested in traveling to Santa Cruz's Sister City of Shingu, Japan, in spring 2020.



The presentation, open to all Santa Cruz County teenagers and their families, will share information about participation in the Sister Cities Teen Delegation. In 2019, the program sent 12 Santa Cruz County students in grades 8-10 to visit Shingu, where they learned about a different culture and experienced the natural beauty of the area.

"The Santa Cruz Public Libraries strives to connect teens with cultural and educational opportunities that will broaden their horizons," said Library Director Susan Nemitz. "The Sister Cities Teen Delegation is a great example of a program that challenges teens to expand their world view."

Shingu is one of Santa Cruz's five sister cities. Others include Jinotepe, Nicaragua; Puerto La Cruz, Venezuela; Sestri Levante, Italy; and Alushta, Ukraine. Shingu and Santa Cruz have been sister cities for more than four decades.
