University of Santa Cruz Housing Fair

On February 11, 2020, the Santa Cruz City Code and Residential Rental Inspection Services (RRIS) attended the 2nd annual University of California Santa Cruz (UCSC) Housing Fair. The housing fair gathers public and private housing-related agencies at the campus to provide information and resources to students related to off-campus housing options. Approximately 500 attended this year's event, which included students, faculty, and public and private agencies. Over the course of three-hours, Code and RRIS staff interacted with over 200 students, distributed RRIS housing inspection check-lists, explained how staff ensures the Housing and Building codes are met and provided information on the minimum housing requirements for health & safety.

In addition, Code and RRIS staff were able to exchange information with other agencies that serve students and the community, including property management companies, transportation services and the UCSC Housing Office.



126 Eucalyptus

The applicant for the project at 126 Eucalyptus Avenue is holding a community meeting on Tuesday, March 3rd from 6-7:30 P.M. at the Shrine of St. Joseph at 544 West Cliff Drive.

Consistent with the City's Community Outreach Policy, the community meeting will provide an opportunity for the applicant to present their preliminary project design and to receive feedback from attendees. The project, which has undergone a pre-application review by city staff, proposes to redevelop the western portion of the site previously used by *Gateway School*. The proposal is to demolish the school building and develop that portion of the site into a 100 unit senior housing project that includes several different unit types ranging from



independent living to memory care units. The preliminary plans show several two to three story buildings with a Mediterranean architectural style, monarch butterfly friendly landscaping, and parking accessed off Pelton Avenue. As currently designed, the project would require Coastal, Special Use, Design, Historic Alteration, and Non-residential Demolition Authorization permits and may need to apply for exceptions to development standards such as through the Density Bonus provisions.

SCPD Discusses Need for License Plate Readers

The Santa Cruz Police Department, in partnership with Nueva Vista Community Resources, hosted a community meeting to discuss the uptick in gun violence against members of the Latino community in the City of Santa Cruz.



Santa Cruz Police met with the Beach Flats neighborhood affected by cases of gun violence to talk about License Plate Readers (LPR). To keep our community safe, we can use technology that identifies vehicles, tracks leads, and helps law enforcement capture the evidence to solve crime.

The plan is to borrow several license plate-reading cameras from [Northern California Regional Intelligence Center](#). The cameras will be set up in areas of high gun violence in Beach Flats neighborhood and other key areas in the city.



There is a proposed ordinance circulating that would significantly limit the police use of technology, please join the discussion. Investigators will use LPR to develop leads in gun violence cases. License plate readers will help officers catch criminals and, in fact, be a deterrent to those wanting to commit a crime in the City of Santa Cruz.

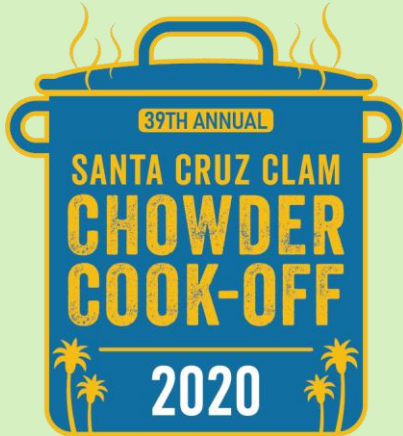

PUBLIC WORKS

Engineering

This week in our Rail Trail Segment 7/Phase I project marked the beginning of 12' wide trail construction between Bay Street and Lennox Street. Work should take approximately two more weeks before the trail is paved in this section. The corner curb ramps at Bay/Redwood were also constructed. Next week the last two curb ramps at Bay/California will be constructed; excavation work for Almar Avenue will also start.



Resource Recovery

A reminder that used batteries are hazardous waste and therefore must be disposed of properly. Wastewater Treatment Facility

Operations entered the permitted confined space of Solids Contact Tank #1 to clean it in preparation for repairs on various aeration lines.



Operations drained and then entered the non-permitted confined space of Secondary Clarifier #2 to clean it in preparation for annual maintenance tasks.



The methane gas filter media made of activated carbon was replaced for the gas line feeding into the cogenerating engines. These carbon filters help to remove Siloxanes present in the gas. If left untreated, the siloxanes would foul the spark plugs on the cogenerating engines resulting in increased parts and maintenance labor, thus decreasing the reliability of the engines.



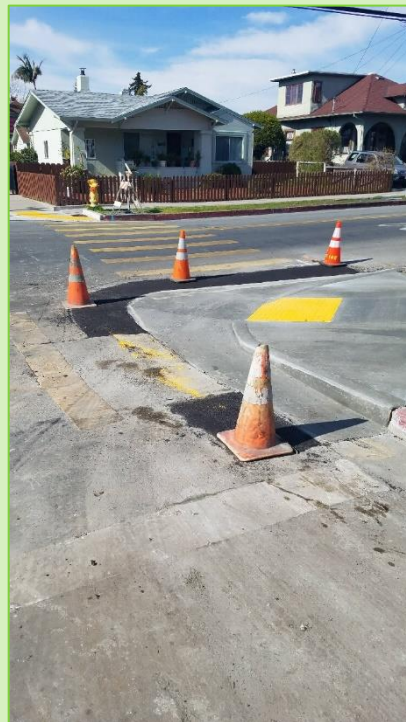
The carbon media was also replaced in two secondary foul odor carbon scrubbers. This activated carbon is generated from coconut husks. It removes sulfides and other foul air odors.



A microtox test was conducted on material delivered by septage hauling vehicles. This material is tested for trace gases and pH and must comply to the hauler's permits in order to dump, otherwise they are turned away. This protects the biological processes present in the wastewater treatment processes.

Transportation Engineering

Construction continues for the Citywide Safe Routes to School Crossing Improvement Program. Norcal Contractor has installed 23 ADA curb ramps near or adjacent to Santa Cruz City Schools. The last curb ramp at the intersection of Water Street and Poplar Avenue will be completed next week. The subcontractor, Darrel Varni Electric, will be installing rectangular rapid flashing beacon systems and streetlights in the next two to three weeks. Construction is anticipated to be completed by this May. This project is funded by the Active Transportation Program Cycle 2 grant.

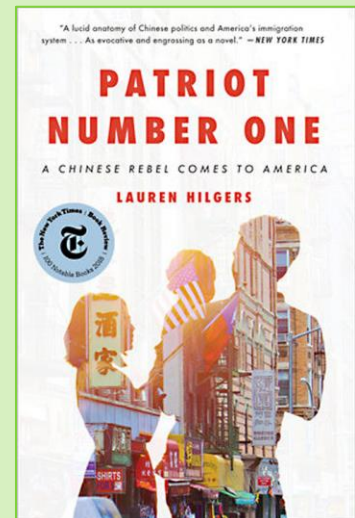
Author Talk: Lauren Hilgers

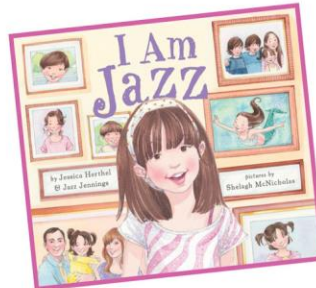

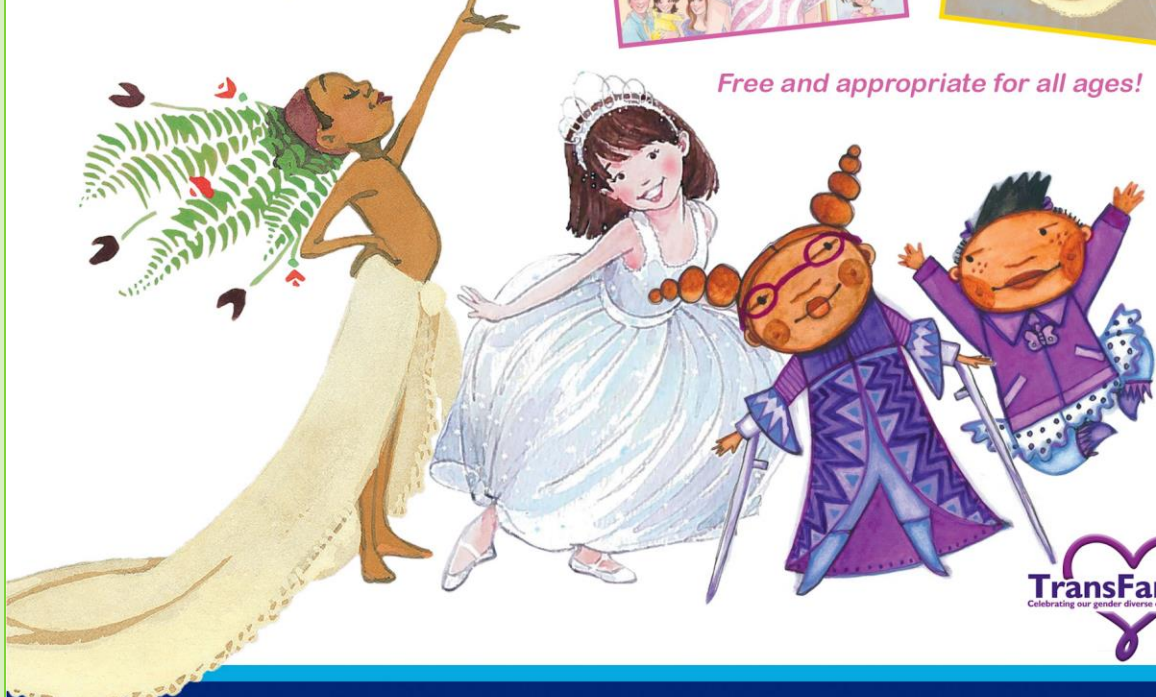
