




PUBLIC WORKS

We are scheduled to begin construction of the [Coastal Rail Trail Segment 7 – Phase I Project](#) on Tuesday, Jan. 21. The 1.2 mile long segment will run from Bay Street/California Street to Natural Bridges Drive. Construction is expected to be completed in about eight months, by the end of summer 2020. 
Wastewater Treatment Facility

The facility shut down this past Wednesday to allow for maintenance work on the secondary treatment part of the process. From 5-9 a.m. we closed the influent gate and continued to allow the flow from the County to enter the treatment facility. Emptied out-of-service tanks were used as 'temporary storage pockets' to fill during the shutdown while flow was backed up slightly into the sanitary sewer collection system. As soon as it was safe to enter the confined space, our mechanics jumped in and removed and replaced an in-house pre-fabricated aeration pipe. Flows were allowed back into the treatment system at 9 a.m. without any adverse impacts to the community. Our master mechanic was able to design and fabricate the intricate pipe for a perfect fit ensuring smooth removal and replacement.



After the facility shutdown, we drained and cleaned the various flow 'temporary storage pockets' in the primary sedimentation basins.

Mechanics disconnected the primary electricity cogenerating engine so it could be transferred off-site for its annual preventative maintenance rebuild.



We are replacing the gas line that feeds the anaerobic-digester-produced-gas (methane) to the gas-chilling equipment before it is fed to the electricity cogenerating engines. During this repair the facility is unable to utilize the methane gas for electricity generation and is burning off the excess gas. (Carbon dioxide is the released product from burning waste methane gas. It is environmentally safer to release the carbon dioxide than the far stronger methane gas.)




